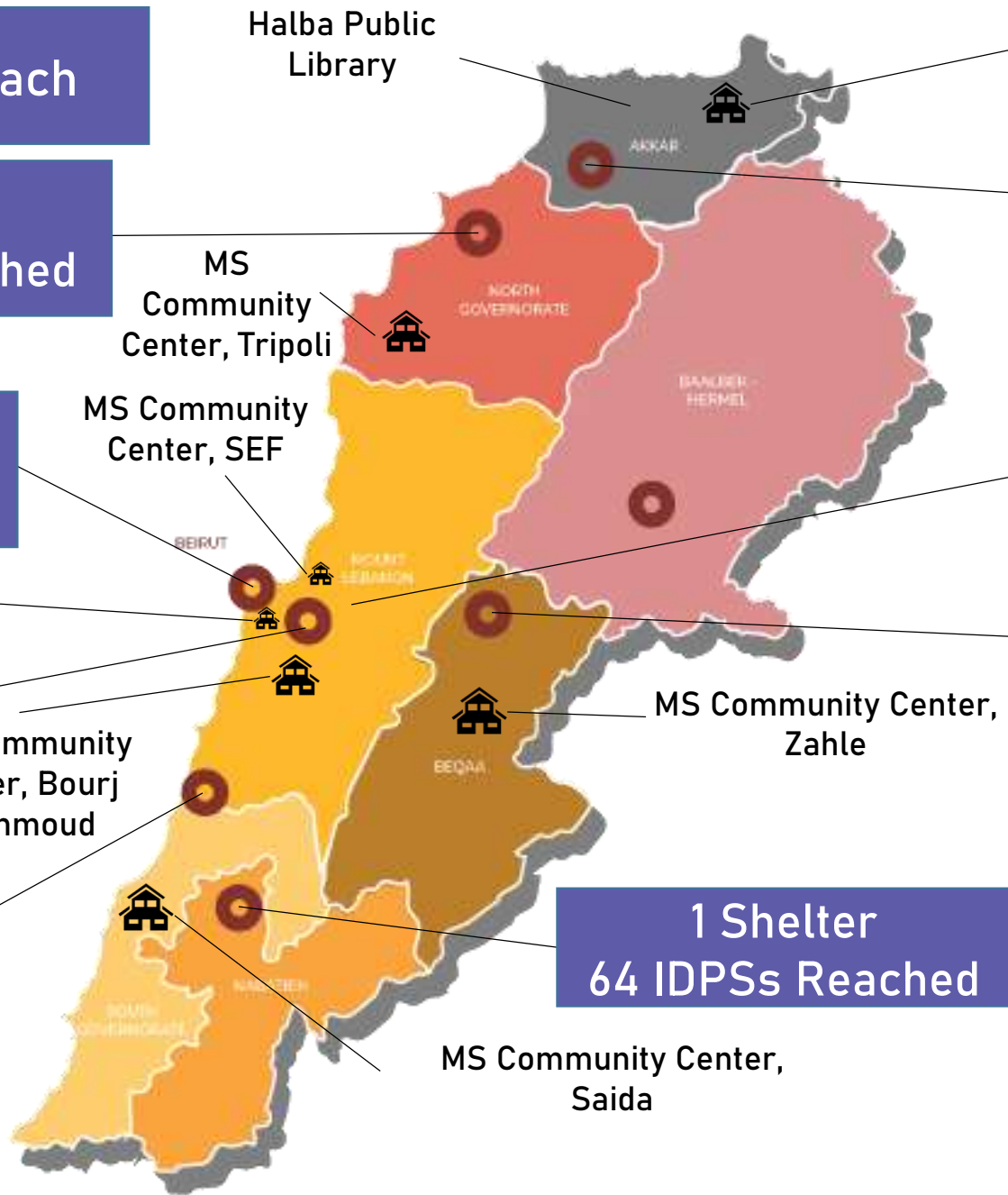

- Recreational Activities with the children: In a displacement/shelter context, the objectives are: psychosocial relief, routine and structure, safe expression of emotions, reducing tension in crowded shelters and inclusive participation.

FLER

FLER is a short-term (up to six months) emergency program designed to rapidly support children affected by crises, starting within the first six weeks. It follows a phased recovery approach, beginning with psychosocial stabilization and gradually transitioning children back into structured learning pathways.

The intervention is built around five key recovery principles: safety, emotional regulation, social connectedness, self-efficacy, and hope. These are delivered through integrated components including psychosocial support sessions (CBPSS), recreational and creative activities, life-saving awareness messages, social-emotional learning programs, basic literacy and numeracy support, and engagement with caregivers and communities to reinforce protective environments for children.

- Information sessions aim to raise awareness and equip participants with essential knowledge on key topics, including Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA), promoting safe reporting mechanisms, accountability, and positive community practices.
- Caregiver Community-Based Psychosocial Support sessions provides group-based psychosocial support to caregivers, offering a safe space to share experiences and manage stress. Through facilitated discussions, practical exercises, and psychoeducation, caregivers strengthen coping skills, resilience, and self-care practices. The sessions also promote peer support and social connection, helping reduce isolation and improve overall well-being.
- Children Community-Based Psychosocial Support sessions provides structured group activities that enhance children's emotional well-being, resilience, and social skills in safe, supportive environments.

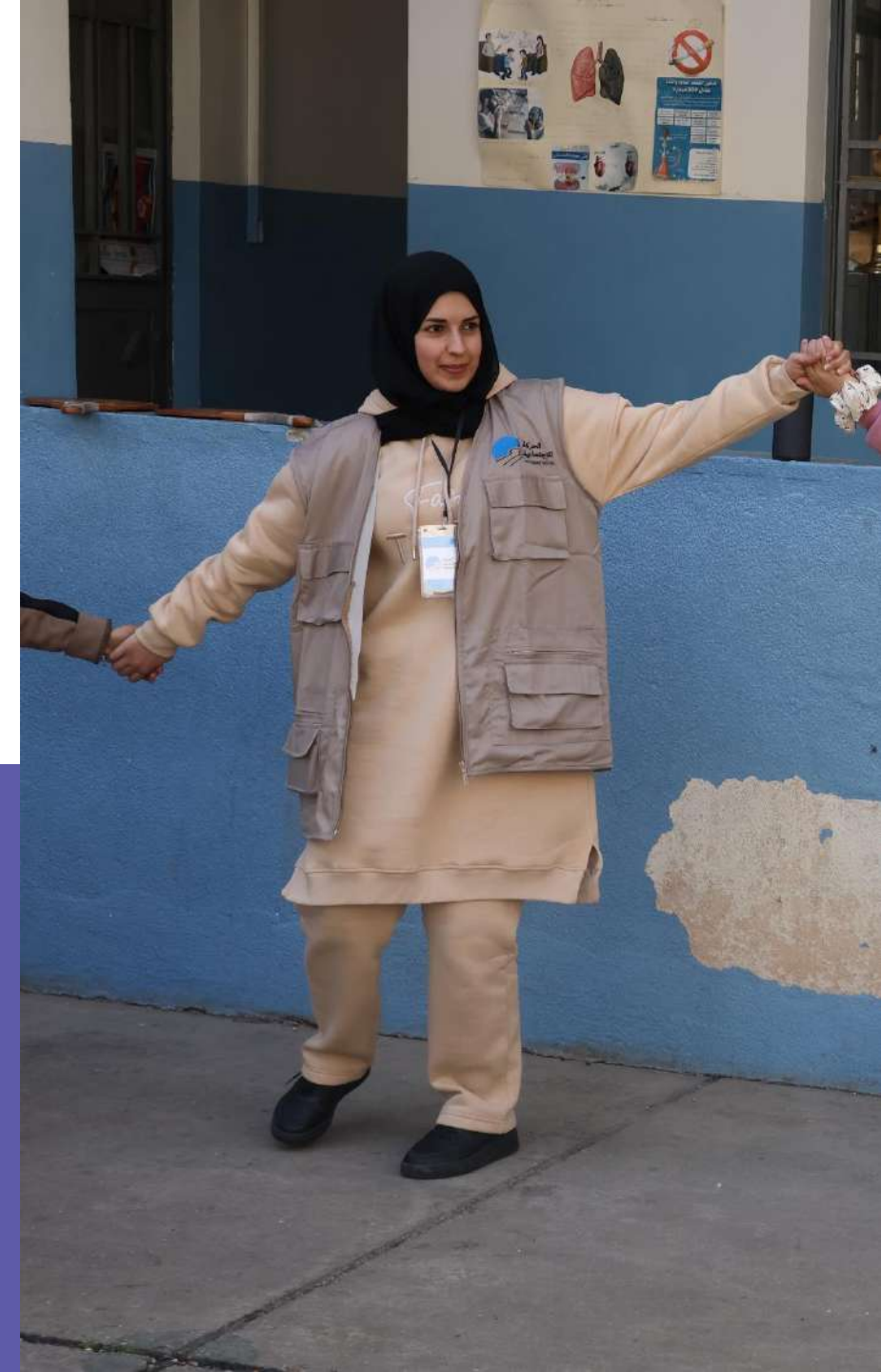

- Information sessions on the Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) are conducted to strengthen community understanding of reporting mechanisms, rights, and available support services.
- Case management services are provided to identify, assess, and support individuals with specific protection needs through appropriate referrals and follow-up.
- Caregivers' Psycho-social First Aid Session provides immediate, compassionate support to individuals affected by crisis, focusing on ensuring safety, active listening, and addressing their basic needs. It helps reduce distress, promotes a sense of calmness and resilience, and, moreover, it connects individuals to appropriate services and support systems.

Women, children, and persons with disabilities are disproportionately affected by displacement and economic hardship. Many displaced families are living on the streets or in overcrowded conditions, with limited access to sanitation facilities and food. Children, in particular, face heightened protection risks, including child labor, school dropout, and psychosocial distress due to exposure to violence and instability. The Bourj Hammoud Drop-In Center serves as a critical community hub, where vulnerable individuals can access essential services in a safe and dignified environment, including hygiene facilities, hygiene kits, and hygiene awareness sessions.

- The **distribution of Menstrual Hygiene Management Kits** was adapted based on documented protection and dignity risks affecting displaced women and girls in overcrowded shelter settings, where humanitarian reporting highlighted limited privacy, inadequate sanitation, and increased exposure to gender-based violence.
- **MHM awareness sessions** aim to raise awareness of menstrual hygiene management and ensure that women understand how to properly use and maintain menstrual hygiene kits.

The Social and Behavioral Change (SBC) program promotes the inclusion and protection of children with disabilities. Through stress-sensitive edutainment and storytelling activities (such as Jad and Tala), the project delivers psychosocially supportive messages and fosters practical, inclusion-oriented engagement. It targets all age groups through awareness sessions, including PSEA, and the dissemination of information on available services, while actively engaging children with and without disabilities in inclusive recreational activities to promote children's rights. The project also strengthens community capacities to implement SBC and inclusion programs. Additionally, children with disabilities are referred to and supported with specialized services, including therapy and assistive devices, based on identified needs.
